
God Calls Jeremiah

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your children imagine and wonder.
- Read Hero of the Rails (Thomas & Friends) by Rev. W. Awdry to learn about Thomas the Tank Engine's justice encounter.
- Help your children think of helpful things they're almost old enough to do. Share your vision that they will do many helpful things in their lifetime.



Responding to God's Grace

- Sing the refrain of "Here I Am, Lord," no. 69 in the *Glory to God* hymnal, or search the Internet for the words.
- Tell your children about a time when you were afraid to do something, but did it anyway. Share how you experienced that God was with you in the task.
- Invite your children to draw a picture of what they will do when God calls them.

Celebrating in Gratitude

- Help your children collaborate on saying a table grace for one of today's meals. Remind your children that like Jeremiah, they are not too young to find words to speak with God.
- Ask your children if they remember anything from the children's time during worship or their Sunday school lesson. Celebrate with them whatever parts of the story they are able to retell.
